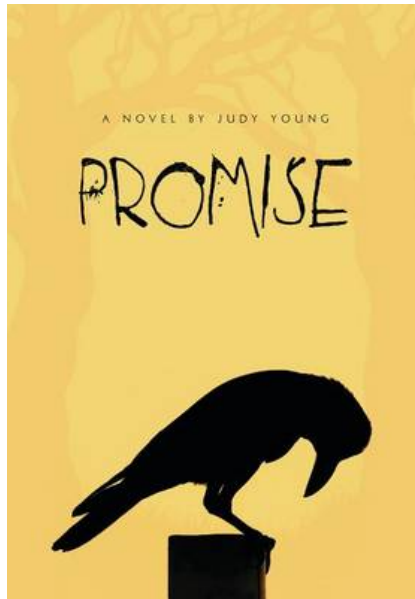


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Children and Young Adult Book Review *Middle School* Promise

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Educator Review:

Growing up in the small town of Promise has been anything but simple for eleven-year-old Kaden. His mother passed away, his father was recently released from prison, and he was forced to live with his grandmother who was determined to not make the same mistakes with Kaden as she did with his father. As a result, Kaden is discouraged from having friends, with exception to a bird named Kubla. It's not until the new student Yo-Yo moves to town that Kaden is able to find a true friend who helps him stand up to his school bully and work through his emotional turmoil of whether or not to accept his father back into his life, despite signs that he has returned to his criminal ways.

Promise is a worthwhile read as it tackles the unique situation of a father's return to society from prison and the strain it causes on his son. This book expands the parental-prison narrative by exploring it from a rural setting, which is often underrepresented in young adult literature. Many of Kaden's issues come about as a result of the rumors that arise from his father's imprisonment and these rumors and conflicts are compounded by the fact that this story takes place in a small town. Young gives a voice to an audience of readers who are largely overlooked by young adult authors by showing how incarceration impacts the bond between a father and a son in a small town.
