


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**Review of *This is How We Do It*

This thoughtfully put together book allows the reader to catch a glimpse into the everyday lives of seven kids who live in different parts of the world. The author, through conversations with the seven-year-old protagonist, allows the reader to see where they live, with whom they live, what they wear to school and even what activities that they engage in after school. The seven profiled kids are positioned as agents as they take part in various activities. The children are drawn in such a way as to invite the reading public to engage/connect with them as individuals not as stylized representations of everyone that lives in their home countries. I especially loved having the opportunity to see real pictures of the young protagonist and their families at the end of the book. The pictures were taken full on so that the viewing audience is able to make eye contact with each family and thus forge a sense of connection and familiarity.

As someone that was born in the US, but who lived abroad for many years and only recently returned with my foreign-born son and spouse to the US, I relished the chance to read a book that would potentially give me and others a chance to glimpse how others live. I believe that this book will appeal to K-5 teachers who want to expose their students to young children between the ages of 6 and 11. Additionally, this book will appeal to parents who embrace multicultural children’s literature as one way of helping their own children to see representations of themselves in books and/or want an opportunity to let their children see how others live around the world.

The author, Matt Lamothe, writes in the closing pages of the book under the section “Meet the Families”, that he wanted to allow others to catch a glimpse into the lived experiences of families from different parts of the world. Although that was his goal, he was very explicit in stating that he did not intend for this glimpse to be interpreted as the way that everyone in that country lives. I believe that it is important that educators preface this book with that thought in mind. They need to make it clear to their students that this is just a glimpse into the lives of these seven kids and although they may be somewhat typical they are not representative of the experiences of everyone who lives in the profiled seven countries.
