


Review of Looking for Yesterday Written by Alison Jay

A young boy, at the beginning of the story, wishes he could relive a happy yesterday. He spends the first half of the book contemplating how that may be achieved. The boy inquires of his grandfather as to how he might time travel. His grandfather attempts to impart a lesson to the boy, demonstrating that there will be other happy days to look forward to. He uses examples from his life to do so.

It is difficult to say who this book would appeal to. It seems to have a length and format for a younger audience. However, there are terminology and concepts that may be well above the intended age group's comprehension level. The illustration, format, and length would suggest that 6-8 years old children would prefer it. However, many concepts are too advanced for that group. Perhaps a very curious and gifted 8 or 9-year-old child may enjoy this book.
